## TRADING MANAGER'S REPORT FOR 2009

Following 3 years of almost static turnover figures it was most encouraging to see an increase this year of about £1,130, or more than 7%. Surprisingly our sales of composts were a little down, but this is a very competitive area and we can never hope to compete with the bulk buying power of superstores. However, not many of them stock the quality of composts that we do, and generally you get what you pay for! Also, all our stock is now kept under cover to keep it in better condition. Some composts have gone down in price this year, helped by the lower rate of VAT (provided we pay for it before 1<sup>st</sup> Jan), others like Levington have gone up. Our Growbags will be dearer this year at £1.75, but you will be hard pressed to find similar quality ones for less than £2.00 anywhere else. It doesn't seem that long ago that the target price was 99p!!

After 2 years of meteoric rises, there are signs that prices of some fertilisers may be coming down. Growmore, for instance, which used to be about £6 a bag shot up to £18 and has now come back down to about £15.

Last years seed potatoes sold so well that I have ordered the same varieties, i.e. Accent, Foremost, Kestrel, Charlotte, Desiree, Romano and Valor. Several members said how successful Valor had been and will no doubt be pleased to see that the price has come down this year. Delivery is expected in January and so should be in the Store by the time you read this.

Thanks are again due to all the regular helpers at the Store and to those I have been able to call on for occasional help.

## **CHRISTMAS POTATOES**

These are seed potatoes held back in cold store until July so that they produce new potatoes in time for Christmas, or earlier, hence the name. We have tried various varieties and this year I ordered Charlotte, which is classed as a salad potato. I grew them outside in large pots and started harvesting them in mid November. I was impressed with the yield of roughly egg-sized tubers, certainly more than other varieties in the past. If you grew them, let me know how you got on so that I can order as appropriate.

## **VINE WEEVIL – SOMETHING TO TRY**

Often described as the pest of the decade, I, like many others have had big problems in the past the vine weevil. One year I lost more than half my fuchsias and they have regularly attacked my hostas and begonia tubers. I used to try and keep them at bay with products like Gamma BHC, all of which now seem to be off the market. However, a few years ago I noticed that some pots were less badly affected than others, and the common factor seemed to be that I had used broken-up polystyrene in the bottom of the pots for drainage. So I have been doing this more generally and, so far this year, have not found any of the grubs. Is there a possible connection, or am I kidding myself? Perhaps this year they have all drowned in the monsoon weather! Perhaps some of you would like to try my theory out and let me know the result. Could this be a green solution, or will it turn out to be wishful thinking?

## **RHUBARB AND STRAWBERRY JAM**

This is a very cheap jam to make and always successful. The recipe was given to me by a teacher who taught special needs children. She said that they made it every year and it always worked. The quantities are in ounces because this was how it was given to me. I have tried making jam with out of season, imported fruit and it does not seem to work. Perhaps because the fruit has not been allowed to ripen before it has been picked and shipped half way across the world. An old jam-making friend of mine always swore that it was better to use cane sugar in jam making rather than sugar processed from sugar beet. Chemically, I believe that they are both the same, but she said that sugar beet sugar just did not seem to keep so well. Anyway, it may be worth seeking out cane sugar if you expect to keep your jam for any length of time.

8 ounces rhubarb, washed and chopped into slices about quarter inch long (you will understand why in a minute)

8 ounces strawberries, roughly sliced

16 ounces (1lb) sugar

Method – put all the ingredients into your saucepan, and leave it for at least 4 hours until the sugar has dissolved. (Trust me)

Just heat up the mixture and cook as for jam, until setting point is reached (use the wrinkle method). Put into hot sterilized jars and cover tightly. Delicious. Tastes of strawberries and not rhubarb.
